
Way-out lighting: new ideas, some new designers

When designers say "contemporary lighting" these days, they mean it, for even such perennial favorites as the simple glowing white globe is being clustered in new ways. Not all simple forms are in familiar lamps, however, for some are being coiled into snappy but functional forms with the sculptural look of machined jewelry clipped on to walls. 6 East 53rd Street, New York. The sensational, new "Snoopy" lamp, designed by A. & P. Castiglioni for Atelier, is a very important lamp on the scene, and a timely creation for office desk or table. Its unusually shaped shade is made of enameled spun aluminum and gives the lamp its dog's head look. The shade rests on a %" piece of plate glass and is supported by a cylindrical base of white Carrara marble. (The switch is right on the base itself. The shade is available in blue, orange, green, or wrinkled black. The entire lamp stands 15" high and is 151/2" in diameter.

A hanging wall light of polished silver and plated brass, "Foglio", serves as both a wall light and decoration piece. A bent sheet of polished silver or plated brass that folds in toward the center of the fixture is finished on the inside with matte white to reflect light from the bulbs behind each of the folds. "Foglio" was designed by Tobia Scarpa and measures 14½" long, 8" high.
